Parliamentary Procedure

The following tables contain the terms and phrases used in facilitating the proceedings during committee sessions in AMWHO conferences. You may be familiar with them if you have prior conference experience, but if not, this table is meant to help guide you during committee sessions. As intimidating as the table may seem, this language is easy to pick up.

Addressing the Dias When speaking to the Chair, use titles of either "Chair" or "Honorable

Chair." Similarly, call the Vice-Chair and Rapporteur by their title.

For and Against Speeches During debate, this may be used to have speakers represent

affirmative and opposing opinions. This typically provides a

speaking time of 30 seconds.

Yielding Time Delegates may allot the remainder of their speaking time to

1) the Chair, discarding the time, 2) other delegates, or 3) for questions. (

e.g. "Fiji yields their time to the Chair.")

Note passing is encouraged as a method of communication

between individual delegates, or with the Dais, without using

speaking time during committee sessions and plenary.

Must be unfriendly; if friendly, automatically a part of the resolution

Parliamentary Procedure

Operative clauses of a working paper offer solutions to issues addressed in the perambulatory section.

These clauses are action-oriented and should include a verb at the beginning of a sentence, followed by the proposed solution. Each clause should be numbered and punctuated by a semicolon, with the exception of the last operative clause, which should end with a period.
